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Mountain Lake PBS Selects Four Hitachi Z-HD5000 HD Studio Cameras for Local Show Production

"After evaluating the top HD camera systems on the market, I chose the Hitachi Z-HD5000 due to its exceptional price and performance. I was impressed with the picture quality these cameras produced and pleased that this robust camera package fit within our budget."

The cameras are switched by a new Broadcast Pix Granite 5000 2 M/E HD live production system, with integrated functionality including graphics, clip/still store, six keyers and Fluent-view multi-image monitoring.

In addition to local programming, Mountain Lake PBS also produces long-form documentaries, some of which are chosen for broadcast nationwide on the PBS network. Among the more recent Mountain Lake PBS productions that have aired nationally are

Cirque du Soleil: Flowers in the Desert, Dead Reckoning, and Champlain in America. Zarbo

said the new Hitachi cameras will contribute to the quality of the long-form programming they

produce for local and national audiences.

At Mountain Lake PBS, the camera crew especially appreciates the 8-inch color viewfinder

on the new studio cameras, which offer precision focusing of the HD image. The

Z-HD5000s also incorporate: 14-bit analog to digital conversion, advanced digital signal

processing, and HD picture enhancement tools.

"Our local programs enable us to fulfill our mission to educate, inform, and entertain the

viewers of this region," said Zarbo. "These Hitachi cameras are now an integral part of our

local production efforts."
